



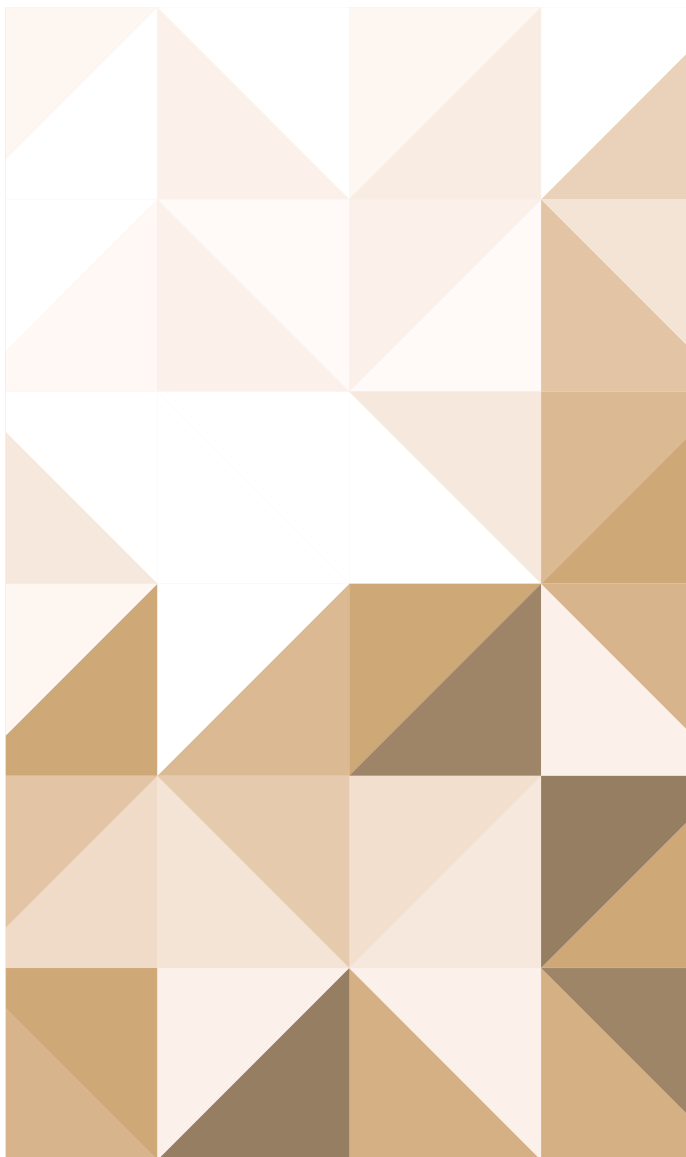

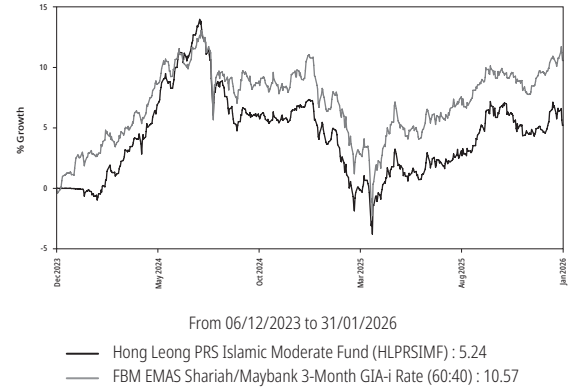

Performance Review

This Semi-Annual Report covers the six-month financial period from 1 August 2025 to 31 January 2026.

The Fund posted a return of 3.14% (based on NAV Per Unit-to-NAV Per Unit basis with gross income (if any) from the Fund reinvested) in the past six months while its benchmark FBM EMAS Shariah Index (60%) and 3-Month GIA-i Rate (40%) registered a return of 4.67%.

Since launch, the Fund has registered a return of 5.24% compared to the benchmark's return of 10.57%.

Chart 2: Asset Allocation – August 2025 to January 2026

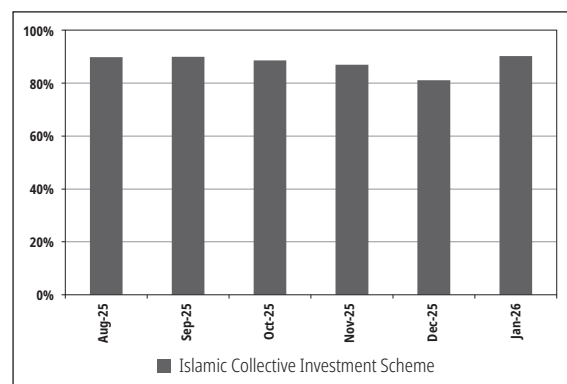
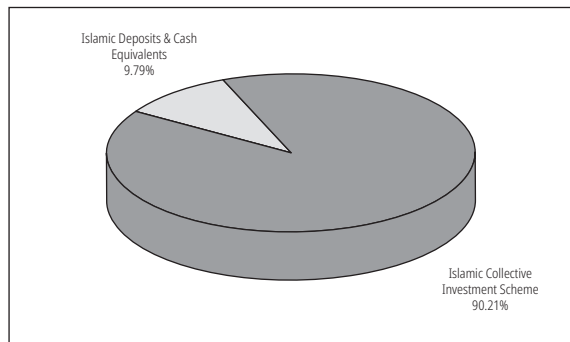


Chart 3: Sector Allocation as at 31 January 2026



Strategies employed by the Fund during the period under review

During the financial period under review, the Fund invested at least 70% of the Fund's Net Asset Value (NAV) in balanced Islamic Collective Investment Scheme (CIS) and up to 30% of the Fund's NAV in sukuk and/or Islamic money market CIS.

An explanation on the differences in portfolio composition

During the financial period under review, the Fund invested 90.21% (previous period: 86.78%) in Hong Leong Dana Maa'rof and the balance of 9.79% (previous period: 13.22%) was invested in Islamic money market and Islamic cash deposits and equivalents.

Operational review of the Fund

For the financial period under review, there were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Fund or circumstances that would materially affect the interest of members up to the date of this PRS Provider's report.

IV. MARKET REVIEW

Shariah-compliant Equities

During the financial period under review, both FBM KLCI and FBM EMAS Index grew 15.0% and 7.1%, respectively. The Fund's benchmark, FBM EMAS Shariah Index underperformed the conventional peers with a lower gain of 5.7%, due to the absence of strong rally saw in the conventional financial services stocks. Notably, small caps continued to lag behind large caps, with FBM Small Cap Shariah Index only improving by 4.2% during same period. This reflected sustained risk aversion among investors toward smaller companies.

The third quarter of 2025 saw markets continuing its rally, building upon the various tariff trade deals announced in August. Stocks which are seen as beneficiaries to the Artificial Intelligence (AI) Capital Expenditure (CapEx) cycle and China's 'anti-involution' themes rallied strongly. Narrative in the market shifted from tariff headwinds to United States (US) Federal Reserve (Fed) rate cuts which is largely interpreted to be supportive of growth and higher valuations.

The last quarter of 2025 saw high volatility in AI stocks globally. While on one hand company guidance and future CapEx spend was strong, high valuations were also a concern. Overall, despite the volatile quarter, AI stocks still closed the quarter higher. There was increasing concern on the US Fed Independence, resulting in precious metals such as gold and silver to outperform.

Back in Malaysia, the tariff rate with the US was revised from 25% to 19%, in line with other regional peers. This sparked a broad-based rally, recovering much of the declines seen in the early part of 2025. Bank Negara Malaysia (BNM) also cut the Overnight Policy Rate (OPR) by 25 basis points (bps) to 2.75% during the third quarter of 2025, in line with other central banks globally. While the market exhibited more risk on behaviour during the financial period under review, concern still lingers regarding the impending semiconductor tariffs expected to be announced by the US.

The Malaysian Ringgit (MYR) was the centre of attention in the final quarter of 2025. The MYR closed the year 10.3% higher against the US Dollar (USD). The domestic market so rotation with export related stocks declining while banks and consumer stocks did well. An impending large health care Initial Public Offering (IPO) also resulted in some optimism in the health care sector.

Sukuk

During the financial period under review, the domestic sukuk market initially mirrored global bullishness before decoupling to follow a trajectory defined by local fundamentals. At the start of the financial period under review, Government Investment Issues (GII) yields were suppressed by bullish sentiment following BNM pre-emptive 25-basis-point OPR cut in July 2025. However, the market subsequently faced headwinds from a heavy corporate bond pipeline and a softening demand for long-end sukuk on profit taking activities. This domestic shift occurred against the backdrop of a volatile US Treasury (UST) market, which saw an initial August rally driven by weak labour data and easing hopes, but reversed as persistent economic resilience and inflation forced investors to price in a slower easing cycle for 2026.

The resilience of the Malaysian economy further pressured yields upward, with Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth accelerating from 5.4% in 3Q 2025 to a robust 6.3% in 4Q 2025. This momentum, combined with a slight uptick in Consumer Price Index (CPI), led market participants to turn more defensive. Simultaneously, external volatility intensified as the 10Y UST yield surged to 4.24% by late January 2026, fueled by non-economic factors including a Department of Justice (DOJ) investigation into the Fed and aggressive trade rhetoric. Following price corrections in September and October, the GII market demonstrated more stability, aided by potential reduction in government bond supply for 2026 and a strengthening MYR. However, the convergence of spiking Japanese bond yields and US political noise ultimately pushed GII yields higher across the curve by end-January in a bear-steepening fashion.

V. FUTURE PROSPECTS AND PROPOSED STRATEGIES

Shariah-compliant Equities

Malaysia enters 2026 with GDP expected to remain stable at the high-4% level, inflation relatively benign and the MYR showing signs of strengthening. This provides a constructive backdrop for equity returns and leaves room for potential support if needed. A firmer currency could help normalise foreign flows back into the market, with banks and liquid large caps likely to offer the highest sensitivity to such inflows. At the same time, a visible pipeline of multi-gigawatt Data Centre (DC) investments points to ongoing demand for power and water infrastructure, while the correction in small-to-mid cap stocks in 2025 is opening up selective opportunities where valuations have turned more attractive.

Sukuk

We expect positive UST performance as the rate-cut cycle continues, although returns may moderate amidst vulnerability to macroeconomic shifts and fiscal concerns, potentially driving further curve steepening.

Domestically, we expect the OPR to remain at 2.75% due to benign inflation and a resilient economy. Yields are supported by the absence of immediate rate-cut catalysts but remain capped by a slowing global growth outlook and subdued local inflation. This balanced environment suggests that the domestic sukuk market will likely stay range-bound.

We continue to favour high credit quality corporate sukuk over GII and government guaranteed Islamic papers for yield pickup. We will continue to look for trading opportunities in both GII and corporate sukuk.

VI. SOFT COMMISSIONS

The PRS Provider may receive soft commissions from brokers/dealers in the form of goods and services such as research materials, data and quotation services incidental to investment management of the Fund and investment related publications. Such soft commissions received are utilised in the investment management of the Fund and are of demonstrable benefit to the Fund and members and there was no churning of trades.

During the financial period under review, the Fund has not received goods or services by way of soft commissions.

VII. SECURITIES LENDING OR REPURCHASE TRANSACTIONS

No securities lending or repurchase transactions have been carried out during the financial period under review.

NOTES TO THE CONDENSED FINANCIAL

STATEMENTS (Unaudited)

FOR THE FINANCIAL PERIOD ENDED 31 JANUARY 2026

1. THE FUND, THE PRS PROVIDER AND THEIR PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Hong Leong PRS Islamic Moderate Fund ("the Fund") was constituted pursuant to the execution of a Deed dated 15 September 2023 between Hong Leong Asset Management Bhd ("the PRS Provider") and CIMB Islamic Trustee Berhad ("the Scheme Trustee") for the members of the Fund.

The Fund aims to seek capital growth over the long-term while seeking income returns.

The Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing in a basket of Islamic collective investment schemes which have similar investment objective to the Fund's investment objective of capital growth over the long-term while seeking income returns. Investments in Islamic collective investment schemes will be confined to those managed by the PRS Provider. The Fund will invest a minimum of 70% of its net asset value into balanced Islamic collective investment schemes and up to 30% of its net asset value into sukuk and/or Islamic money market collective investment schemes. The PRS Provider will actively monitor the Fund's investments in the selected Islamic collective investment schemes to ensure optimal returns while adhering to the Fund's pre-determined asset allocation. The PRS Provider has the flexibility to rebalance the asset allocation should it deem necessary based on the prevailing market conditions. The Fund commenced operations on 6 December 2023 and will continue its operations until terminated as provided under Part 14 of the Deed.

The PRS Provider of the Fund is Hong Leong Asset Management Bhd, a company incorporated in Malaysia. The principal activity of the PRS Provider is the management of unit trust funds, private retirement schemes and private investment mandates. Its holding company is Hong Leong Capital Berhad, a company incorporated in Malaysia and listed on the Main Market of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad.

Hong Leong Islamic Asset Management Sdn Bhd (“HLISAM”) is the external fund manager appointed for Hong Leong PRS Islamic Moderate Fund. The effective date for the appointment is on 17 April 2020. HLISAM is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Manager. On November 2019, HLISAM was issued with an Islamic fund management license by the Securities Commission Malaysia (“SC”) to undertake the regulated activity of Islamic fund management.

2. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements:

(a) Basis of preparation

The condensed financial statements are unaudited and have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standard 134 “Interim Financial Reporting” and International Accounting Standard 34 “Interim Financial Reporting”.

The condensed financial statements should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements of the Fund for the financial year ended 31 July 2025 which have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards (“MFRS”) and International Financial Reporting Standards.

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities

Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss, and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its Shariah-compliant investments based on both the Fund’s business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flows characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets’ performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities¹ as fair value through other comprehensive income. The contractual cash flows of the Fund’s debt securities² are solely principal and profit. However, these Shariah-compliant securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund’s business model’s objective. Consequently, all Shariah-compliant investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents and amount due from the PRS Provider as financial assets measured at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

The Fund classifies amount due to the PRS Provider, amount due to the Scheme Trustee and amount due to the PPA as financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date – the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Shariah-compliant investments are initially recognised at fair value.

¹ For the purposes of the investments made by the Fund, equity securities refer to Shariah-compliant equity securities.

² For the purposes of the investments made by the Fund, debt securities refer to sukuk.

Financial liabilities, within the scope of MFRS 9, are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the Shariah-compliant investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Unrealised gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss in the financial period which they arise.

Dividend income from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as part of dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established.

Unquoted Islamic collective investment scheme is valued at the last published net asset value per unit at the date of the statement of financial position.

Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions are stated at cost plus accrued profit calculated on the effective profit rate method over the period from the date of placement to the date of maturity of the respective Islamic deposits, which is a close estimate of their fair value due to the short term nature of the Islamic deposits. Financial assets at amortised cost and other financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective profit rate method.

Impairment

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. Management considers both historical analysis and forward looking information in determining any expected credit loss. Management considers the probability of default to be closed to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month expected credit losses as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit-impaired.

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of obligor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to pay the amount. The Fund may write-off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial period.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the “functional currency”). The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (“RM”), which is the Fund’s functional and presentation currency.

(d) Income recognition

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date when the Fund’s right to receive payment is established.

Profit income from Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions and auto-sweep facility bank account are recognised on the effective profit rate method on an accrual basis.

Profit income is calculated by applying the effective profit rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit-impaired. For credit-impaired financial assets, the effective profit rate is applied to the net carrying amount of the financial asset (after deduction of the loss allowance).

Realised gain or loss on disposal of unquoted Islamic collective investment scheme is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of unquoted Islamic collective investment scheme, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at banks and Islamic deposits held in highly liquid Shariah-compliant investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with an original maturity of three months or lesser which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(f) Taxation

Private retirement scheme approved by the Securities Commission Malaysia which is regarded as an approved scheme pursuant to the Act, the income accruing is exempted from tax under the Act.

(g) Distribution

A distribution to the Fund’s members is accounted for as a deduction from realised reserve. A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the financial period in which it is approved by the Board of Directors of the PRS Provider.

(h) Members’ capital

The members’ contributions to the Fund meet the criteria to be classified as equity instruments under MFRS 132 “Financial Instruments: Presentation”. Those criteria include:

- the units entitle the member to a proportionate share of the Fund’s net asset value;
- the units are the most subordinated class and class features are identical;
- there is no contractual obligations to deliver cash or another financial asset other than the obligation on the Fund to repurchase the units; and
- the total expected cash flows from the units over its life are based substantially on the profit or loss and change in the net asset value of the Fund.

The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the date of the statement of financial position if member exercises the right to put the unit back to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at prices based on the Fund’s net asset value per unit at the time of creation and cancellation. The Fund’s net asset value per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to members with the total number of outstanding units.

(i) Fair value of financial instruments

Financial instruments comprise financial assets and financial liabilities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The information presented herein represents the estimates of fair values as at the date of the statement of financial position.

The Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities are measured on an ongoing basis at either fair value or at amortised cost based on the respective classification.

(j) Critical accounting estimates and judgements in applying accounting policies

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information content of the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impact to the Fund's results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the PRS Provider and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

In undertaking any of the Fund's investment, the PRS Provider will ensure that all assets of the Fund under management will be valued appropriately, that is at fair value and in compliance with the Securities Commission Malaysia's Guidelines on Private Retirement Schemes.

However, the PRS Provider is of the opinion that there are no accounting policies which require significant judgement to be exercised.

3. FAIR VALUE ESTIMATION

Financial instruments comprise financial assets and financial liabilities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The information presented herein represents the estimates of fair values as at the date of the statement of financial position.

The Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities are measured on an ongoing basis at either fair value or at amortised cost based on the respective classification.

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as trading Shariah-compliant securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the reporting date. The Fund utilises the last traded market price for financial assets where the last traded price falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the PRS Provider will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

The fair value of financial assets that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each period/year end date. Valuation techniques used for non-standardised financial instruments such as Islamic options, Islamic currency swaps and other over-the-counter Islamic derivatives, include the use of comparable recent arm's length transactions, reference to other Shariah-compliant instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity-specific inputs.

For instruments for which there is no active market, the Fund may use internally developed models, which are usually based on valuation methods and techniques generally recognised as standard within the industry. Valuation models are used primarily to value unlisted Shariah-compliant equity and sukuk instruments for which market were or have been inactive during the financial period/year. Some of the inputs to these models may not be market observable and are therefore estimated based on assumptions.

The output of a model is always an estimate or approximation of a value that cannot be determined with certainty, and valuation techniques employed may not fully reflect all factors relevant to the positions the Fund holds. Valuations are therefore adjusted, where appropriate, to allow for additional factors including model risk, liquidity risk and counterparty risk.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an on-going basis.

(i) Fair value hierarchy

The table below analyses financial instruments carried at fair value. The different levels have been defined as follows:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1);
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (Level 2); and
- Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (Level 3).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that requires significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement. Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgement, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgement by the Fund. The Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

4. MANAGEMENT FEE AND MANAGEMENT FEE REBATE

In accordance with Division 15.1 of the Deed, the PRS Provider is entitled to a management fee of up to 3.00% per annum calculated daily based on the net asset value of the Fund.

For the financial period ended 31 January 2026, the management fee is recognised at a rate of 1.25% (2025: 1.25%) per annum.

The management fee rebate relates to the rebate received from the PRS Provider for investing in unquoted Islamic collective investment scheme. The rate of rebate was calculated on the net asset value of respective unquoted Islamic collective investment scheme on a daily basis as follow:

For the financial period ended 31 January 2026, the Scheme Trustee's fee is recognised at a rate of 0.04% (2025: 0.04%) per annum.

There is no further liability to the Scheme Trustee in respect of Scheme Trustee's fee other than the amount recognised above.

6. PRIVATE PENSION ADMINISTRATOR'S ("PPA") ADMINISTRATION FEE

For the financial period ended 31 January 2026, the PPA's administration fee is recognised at a rate of 0.04% (2025: 0.04%) per annum calculated daily based on the net asset value of the Fund.

There is no further liability to the PPA in respect of PPA's administration fee other than the amount recognised above.

7. AUDITORS' REMUNERATION, TAX AGENT'S FEE AND SHARIAH ADVISORY FEE

For the financial period ended 31 January 2026 and 31 January 2025, auditors' remuneration, tax agent's fee and Shariah advisory fee were borne by the PRS Provider.
